Re: Freedom of Information Request FOI 5963

We are writing in response to your request submitted under the Freedom of Information Act, received in this office on 02nd October 2023.

Your request was as follows:

5. How many employed, full-time members of staff make up your NHS Trust's cyber/infosecurity team?

The WCFT do not have dedicated team members, this is a shared responsibility.









6. How many hours of cybersecurity training are employees of your NHS Trust required to undertake every year?

This is dependent on courses/budget for team members, all staff undergo mandatory security training within ESR and cyber security is included in induction for all staff.

- 7. Has your NHS Trust paid any ransom demands to cybercriminals in the last five years?
- a. If yes, how much did you pay in total?

I confirm that The Walton Centre NHS Foundation Trust holds the information you have requested. However, I am unable to provide you with that information as I consider that the following exemptions apply to it:

Section 31(1a) - The prevention or detection of crime

This information is exempt from disclosure under Section 31(1a) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FoIA). We cannot provide personal information requested as your query on the grounds that the withheld information could be used to facilitate criminal acts such as identity fraud, theft of physical assets from a deceased's estate and criminal trespass. It points out that the requested information directly identifies deceased individuals in circumstances which could suggest that they did not leave relatives and did not leave a will. Consequently The Walton Centre NHS Foundation Trust asserts that disclosure of the requested information could make the assets and identity of those deceased persons vulnerable.

Public Interest Test

To use this exception we are required to undertake a public interest test. The matters which were considered in applying the public interest test are as follows:

Factors in favour of disclosure:

- Disclosure of the data could potentially raise awareness of the general issue, as well as specific cases, increasing the number of cases where genuine beneficiaries can be identified.
- Disclosure of the data supports the general public interest in the transparency, accountability and general understanding of the delivery of public services.

Factors in favour of withholding:

• Disclosure of the exempted data will make it easier for the perpetration of criminal activities against the general public interest in a crime free society, as well as the public concern regarding the efficient use of police resources. Specifically, the theft of the identity of an individual through use of the disclosed data allows those intent on criminal activity the freedom to move around the country and instigate numerous criminal acts. The resources to resolve any criminal activity and track down the perpetrator will either need to be diverted away from other police activity, or will increase the overall cost to the public purse.

This response therefore acts as a refusal notice under section 17 of the FOIA.

I confirm that The Walton Centre NHS Foundation Trust holds the information you have requested. However, I am
